
Contemplative service goes monthly *from Kevin Ziants*

Mosaic Liberal's popular contemplative Friday Night service – *Kabbalat Shabbat* – is going monthly with the launch of a second contemplative service – *Kabbalat Shabbat 2*. From 5th January, the two services will run on the first Friday of alternate months.

The new service, created by Esther Aronsfeld, retains the same gentle rhythm, with new, uplifting music and chants, heart-warming prayers and time for personal *tefillah* and silent reflection.

Kevin Ziants, chair, Rites and Practices, said: 'From feedback I've have been getting since we first introduced our contemplative service in 2014, this kind of service offers people an opportunity to engage with the liturgy, with each other and with God in a more personal and meaningful way. It also provides an oasis of calm at the end of a busy week.'

The first *Kabbalat Shabbat 2* takes place on **Friday 5th January at 7pm**. Everyone is welcome.

'Faith Covenant' *from Rabbi Frank*

On the evening of 15th November 2017, representatives of the London Borough of Brent and local faith leaders signed the 'Faith Covenant'. Brent has followed Barnet to be the second Borough of London to take up this formal acknowledgement of the close engagement and trust-building that should occur between local government and faith groups.

Signatories included the leader of Brent Council and other councillors as well as members of the steering group of the Brent Multifaith Forum including Chairperson Aisha Khan and Rabbi Dr Frank Dabba Smith. Also present was Mosaic Liberal Synagogue member Alan Solomon who has supported the work of the BMFF. Our good friends at the Wembley Central Mosque, Imam Abdul Sattar and Sohail Ahmed, signed the covenant, too.



The Faith Covenant is based on principles including:

- Faith communities are free to practise their beliefs and religious observances without restriction, and to raise their voice in public debate and to be respected, within the framework of UK law.
- Public services and faith-based social action should respect service users from all backgrounds, with no distinctions on any grounds
- The voice, participation and solutions that faith communities bring are vital, and consultation should enable them to be brought to bear for the benefit of the wider community.

Board of Deputies report *from Michael Reik*

Notes of Plenary Meeting October 29th 2017

The meeting was held on 29th October to coincide with the AJEX march which took place on 19th November to correspond with Balfour Declaration Celebration.

The Holocaust Memorial construction has been agreed to sit outside the House of Lords and should open sometime in 2021. The educational side will include reference to other Genocides that have taken place in other parts of the world to include races other than Jews.

The Deputy for Golders Green Synagogue commended the introduction of the Golders Green Muslim Community Centre which now occupied the Hippodrome and had moved from Cricklewood. Concern was raised at the disturbing letters in the Jewish Press against this project.

Noam (who had participated in the Entebbe Raid in Uganda) the son in law of Sir Sigmund (Siggy) Sternberg explained how his son had donated 60 per cent of his own kidney so his father could live. He made the point that the Board should support Organ Donations as proposed by the Government. Richard Verber (Senior Vice President) then introduced four speakers to remember the Balfour Declaration that had been written by Lord Balfour on 2nd November 1917.

(A) Mark Regev, the Israel ambassador, commented how pleased he was at how the Balfour Declaration was being commemorated in the United Kingdom. A major point made was how the only

state to provide full rights to Arabs in the Middle East was in fact Israel.

(B) Baroness Ruth Deech gave a history of the Jews in Arab Nations prior to the foundation of the State of Israel. She regretted the White Paper produced in 1939 by the British Government which froze emigration to Palestine for Jews. She believed that this might have prevented a major part of the Holocaust.

(C) Tim Vince, Chair of Balfour 100 Christian committee, then spoke as a Christian Zionist, about how his role was to change the views of certain Christians who are anti-Israel (and Jews generally) by pointing out texts in the Bible that state the contrary position.

(D) The Earl of Balfour, a descendant of Lord Arthur Balfour explained how the declaration came about. Arthur Balfour and Chaim Weitzman first met in 1906. Arthur Balfour was interested in a home for the Jews since the offer for a Jewish Homeland in East Africa in 1902 had been refused. Weitzman made the point that Jews could only be interested to live in a land that had once been their own. Arthur Balfour was sure the Jews would succeed in Palestine as they had both the skill and the knowledge to succeed there while having enough capital to succeed in supporting others.

Cameo @ Sandy's Row

They 'CAME AND MET EACH OTHER' at Sandy's Row Synagogue. And it was an exceptionally good place to meet. It was Remembrance Sunday and it was fitting that close by the end of our journey to Spitalfields, in the heart of what was once the 'Jewish East End', we could ponder a while (not too long, for this was the coldest day of the year so far!) at the statue depicting children of the kinder transport. This was the first outing away from the usual boundaries of our homes, for CAMEO, the group started by Bobbi Riesel some few years ago, to enable those who have lost loved ones, to find companionship with others in similar situations, to do just as its title suggests, and 'come and meet each other.' Tony Selman, himself a member of the group, with his Sandy's Row Synagogue hat on, welcomed us and introduced us to this hidden treasure, the oldest Ashkenazi synagogue in London.

Tony, a member of Mosaic Reform, told us how, in the 1840s Dutch Ashkenazi Jewish migrants had begun arriving in Spitalfields, settling in and close by to Sandys Row, setting up businesses, mainly in the tobacco and diamond cutting trades. In 1854 fifty of the families formed 'The Society for Comfort of the Mourners, Kindness and Truth', forming 'The Parliament Court Synagogue', having bought the lease of a former Huguenot chapel in Sandys Row. Haham Dr Artom in his dedication in November 1870 described a temple as being "necessary, like the heart, sending blood, life and heat to all parts of the body." The synagogue remained open during the two World Wars. So well attended in the 50's on high Holy days, many congregants sat in the aisles, on the floor.

Now, as a trustee and a warden, Tony is seeing a slow but sure revival in the Shul's life as it attracts a new Jewish generation returning to the East End. Oh yes, by the way, many of us looked around and could fully appreciate the attraction of

the surroundings, that had quite recently been the choice for several weddings. Tony told us of their enthusiastic, good humoured, Chabad Rabbi, who walked, even sometimes running from his home, several miles, to lead the Shabbat services, at times having a police escort motoring alongside him.

And after so much food for the soul it was time to feed our bodies with delight in what the local Carluccio's had to offer. Our group left the warmth of the synagogue, and even on a cold day, there was a feeling

of warmth and welcome as we had listened to its history, and now enjoyed chatting, reminiscing, togetherness, around the reserved tables for our party. With a note that our next opportunity to come together would be on January 14th for a Post Chanukah Party, I believe that it will not be long before we embark on another 'out of the area' journey to a place of interest where we can enjoy the opportunity to 'Come And Meet Each Other'.

Thanks Tony for your input and to Bobbi for making it all happen.

Reflections on how the British party system might change

As an academic analyst of the party scene in Britain for over forty years, I would like to offer a few reflections on Michael Reik's discussion (*Kehila Monthly*, November) on how the British party system might change.

The political system in Britain is unlikely to be conducive either to the coming together of 'centrist' elements of Labour, the Conservatives and Liberal Democrats or to a Macron-style movement. The political culture of Britain has traditionally favoured a two-party (or two-and-a-half) party system in which contending parties are clearly based on recognisable and competing sets of values and policies. This is reinforced by the 'first past the post' electoral system and the layout and conventions of parliament.

The only example of a 'new' centrist entity in Britain in recent memory was the Social Democratic Party of the 1980s and that comprised a handful of disaffected Labour MPs and one Tory. Their modest success in vote terms was helped by an 'alliance' with the then Liberal Party. When Liberal leader David Steel

forced a formal merger after what he considered to be a disappointing result at the 1987 general election, this resulted in the formation of the Liberal Democratic Party. However, this split the old Liberal party and the Liberal Democrats actually did worse than the sum of its parts.

With regard to the recent spectacular rise of Macron's movement, En Marche, in France, this was based largely on non-partisan support for a presidential candidate; Macron's success was in any case triggered in considerable part by fear of the far-right Front National gaining power. In any case, the political system in France is very different, being semi-presidential in nature thus affording the President considerable authority as well as traditionally sporting a fragmented party system. The party and electoral systems are also different.

It is also worth noting that the window of opportunity for a 'new' party of the left of centre in Britain has passed. If it was to happen, it would have happened in 2015-2016 – but there was insufficient appetite on the Labour back benches whilst the Liberal Democrats turned inward to lick their electoral wounds.

Refuting anti-Semitism at the Labour party conference

Replying to the claims made by Michael Reik (November issue).

He refers to “blatant anti-Semitism that is part of the Corbyn phenomenon”. Such remarks do a disservice to hard working Jewish MPs like Louise Ellman, Luciana Berger and Ruth Smeeth. Has Michael obtained actual Labour documents that have influenced him to form such a judgement or has he relied on the biased press that can't be relied on?

Michael asserts that “Jews in this country, I believe have to be afraid at the possibility of Corbyn becoming Prime Minister”. It would seem the fear arises because it is believed that Corbyn is anti-Semitic. I find no evidence to

support this view.

Corbyn became Labour leader with some questionable baggage. After 32 years as a backbencher Corbyn had associated himself with many Palestinian-supporting individuals and organisations, holding policies some of which I can support.

During the much-derided Labour conference, a rule change initiated by the Jewish Labour Movement, for the first time specifically mentioning anti-Semitism as part of a new anti-racist programme, supported by Corbyn, was overwhelmingly passed.

Many like-minded Jewish Labour members will remain in the Party to fight their corner and will not be deflected by the somewhat naive proposals made at the foot of Michael's letter.

May I say, first of all, that I mentioned Louise Ellman, and Luciana Berger as two MPs for whom I have total respect and with whom I have had discussions. I spoke to Louise recently during the week of the centenary of the Balfour Declaration.

My comments regarding Jeremy Corbyn and his own form of anti-Semitism reflect his frequent comments of never being able to state the word Jew or Jewish without reference to another race and not being able to state the country (Israel) without having to refer to another country.

I also define Corbyn's anti-Semitism and anti-Israel stance by the company he keeps (i.e.

associating with blatant anti-Semites).

He has condoned anti-Semitic literature such as that produced at the Labour Party Conference and will never speak against any specific incidents of anti-Semitism that occurred in the UK. I am not sure whether he supported Luciana Berger in the terrible attacks against her, without reference to other forms of racism.

The motion put forward by Jeremy Newmark and passed at the Labour Party Conference was, in my opinion, to enable Corbyn to have Labour Party Jews on side should Labour come into power.

Finally, anti-Semitism does not have to be defined only by what people say but also by what people do not say.
